



COSTIÈRES DE NÎMES

HISTORY

Vines have been grown in Costières de Nîmes since the days of Ancient Greece. At around the same time. Roman legionaries, returning victorious from the Egyptian campaign, settled in Nîmes. The palm and crocodile, emblem of both the town and appellation, symbolises Egypt's surrender to Rome at the Battle of Actium in 31 BC. In 280, Cassius Severanius, Governor of Narbonne, gave orders to replant the vineyards. In the Middle Ages, the Abbey of Saint Gilles du Gard became

the seat of the Languedoc Commanderie for the Knights Hospitaller of the Order of St John of Jerusalem; this was when viticulture began to develop in earnest. In the 14th century, Nîmes wines were among the most popular at the Papal Court in Avignon.

In the 20th century, both the Canal du Midi and the construction of Philippe Lamour's Canal du Bas-Rhône et du Languedoc proved to be a tremendous asset for winegrowing in the area.






TOTAL PRODUCTION IN 2020 153 380 HL
